"Rubbing God's Ear"

The hallways are still alive with the echoes of a week of VBS and Day Camp. The sound of feet traipsing throughout the stairwells, the laughter of a solved puzzle in the Family Life Center, and the smells of arts and crafts in the Women's Ministry Room are reminders of what it means to engage our faith and our prayer journey in renewed ways. The theme for this year's summer programs centered around our prayer life and the ways in which we center ourselves in prayer. Are they prayers for meals, giving thanks to God for the food we are about to eat? Are they prayers asking for forgives, as we confess the ways in which we "have done and have not done" relation to our life in Christ? Maybe they are prayers of adoration as we express in words our love and respect for God and all that God has done for us in Jesus Christ? Or maybe they are prayers of supplication where our words, our hearts, and our minds center on earnest, yet humble, requests for God's action or insight? All of these, and so many more, are ways in which we are encouraged to deepen our relationship with God; ways we are challenged to lean on God in and through all types of situations and circumstances.

A couple of years ago, I was reading an excerpt from the *Concordia Theological Quarter-ly*, Vol. 76:1-2, that opened with a discussion on Martin Luther's prayer life. In the opening paragraphs of this particular volume, the author, Albert B. Collver, III, notes Luther's discussion of prayer via a letter he wrote to friend, colleague, and fellow reformer Philip Melanchthon during a time of illness. Luther writes with utter fear as his friend is deathly ill and, during this time of Luther's excommunication he is unable to represent himself on the stage of theological discussion, "O God, how the devil has shattered this instrument for me!" Lines later Luther writes that in his ardent prayer he throws himself as, "...the sack before the door, and by rubbing his [God's] ears with all the promise from His own words." (Quotes from: Julius Kostlin, *Life of Luther*, trans. John G. Morris (Philadelphia: Lutheran Publication Society, 1883), 440.) Rubbing God's ears with God's promises. of prayer. And Luther centers this definition on the words of our own Lord's Prayer. There is beautiful and wonderful power in this prayer's words as they are not merely a whimsical request of God but a command of sorts. Jesus instructs his disciples, of all times and places, to pray in this way, without question or hesitation and to invoke the power of the Holy Spirit to heed God's help.

I hope we can take the time this summer to rekindle, reclaim, and maybe even reinvent our personal and corporate prayer life. When the world is in as much flummox as it is right now, when every night we hear of new atrocities around the world even on our own borders, prayer is often our best tool. Prayer that helps us recapture our language of missional leadership. Prayer that invigorates our communities of faith to speak up and speak out. Prayers that help us find the words of forgiveness and hope when all seems to be lost. Be encouraged, dear friends, to find God in prayer, to lay upon God's shoulders your burdens, celebrations, wants, and needs, and to rub God's ears with God's promises. Find the method that works best for you in this season of life and make that way of prayer a part of your every day journey. God is always listening, always attentive, and always ready to intercede for and with us.

June proved to be a very busy month at Emanuel's. In addition to the regularly scheduled activities, we had a *Meet and Greet* on June 3rd for the congregation to meet Pastor Louis Tillman, candidate for the position of Associate Pastor. At a called congregational meeting on June 10th, the members of Emanuel's approved extending a Call to Pastor Louis by a vote of 96 for, 8 against and 1 abstain. At the same meeting, approval was given to go forward with renovation of the church's Fellowship Hall as the 1st stage of our overall renovation project with an initial projected cost of \$375,000. In between these 2 events, 12 members met with Pastor Marcus to form the Fellowship Committee. Known activities to be held throughout the next year were discussed with lead volunteers named for the different activities as a starting point in the organizational process. Kudos to Donna Dodgen-Greiner and Earlene Jarzombek for volunteering to cochair the 150th Anniversary Planning Committee. Vacation Bible School flew by thanks to great Crosstrails Counsellors and spectacular volunteers. It appeared that we would sail smoothly into July as Emanuel's has chosen to continue to look forward and work to be the Church God is calling us to be. Unfortunately, we have hit several speed bumps which has slowed down progress.

To date, Pastor Louis has neither accepted nor declined the Call extended by Emanuel's. During June, he travelled to Indonesia where he had sporadic phone and minimal, if any, internet reception. He returned stateside this past week. According to the Call process, Pastor Louis has 30 days to inform Emanuel's of his decision. God seems to be in control of the Emanuel's revitalization process. We'll see in what direction Pastor Louis is guided.

Approval of the Fellowship Hall renovation has had obstacles thrown in our path. On receiving the authority to move forward with the project, the architects were mandated to contact the Texas Department of Licensing and Registration as the cost of the project exceeded \$50,000. The State has decided that Emanuel's has 2 primary functional spaces the Sanctuary and the Fellowship Hall. A primary functional space must meet all Accessibility Standards. Given that the Fellowship Hall space could have an occupancy of 300 persons, there must be accessible bathrooms available in the immediate vicinity. Bathrooms and shower facilities have been part of the total church/Fellowship Hall renovation initial design on the 1st floor where non-accessible bathrooms already exist. The proposal presented at the called Congregational meeting excluded the bathrooms in an effort to stage funding needs. The bathroom build out would increase the cost of the Fellowship Hall renovation to approximately \$600,000. The Finance Committee met June 20th to discuss options. The general consensus is that Emanuel's should go forward with the total renovation of both the Sanctuary with elevator and the Fellowship Hall. The Finance Committee recommends that the Council approves the use of up to \$150,000 of current investment funds as seed money to get the project rolling with members of Emanuel's pledging the funds through a Capital Campaign to finance the project. Preferably, funds can be raised without the use of consultants. A loan will most likely be necessary. Before planning can go forward with a Capital Campaign, the committee felt that a more precise project cost is needed. Based on the Finance Committee's recommendations, a Fisher-Heck architect(s) will attend the July 9th Council meeting to explain the process and provide a more hard dollar projected cost. An expectation is that the Council will approve going forward with the selection of a contractor as part of a negotiated contract. The architect(s) is to provide the names of a minimum of 3 contractors to be interviewed. In addition, with the initial estimate of \$1.5 million as the cost of the total project and the probability that the cost could easily rise to \$2 million, every Emanuel's member must be involved in meeting the Capital Campaign goal. Unfortunately, studies have found that, typically, 3% of membership pledges 97% of Capital Campaign receipts. Will Emanuel's be a typical congregation, or will we move forward and extend beyond the norm of 3%?

Through action taken by Council, the security entrance panel has been updated. An early Sunday service based on a Morning Matins concept may be started in August. A Mutual Ministry committee has been formed with Pastor John Schwartz, Lindsay May, Hazel Dalton, and Steve Anderson as committee members. Either Dennis Sagebiel or I would be executive committee representatives. Emanuel's will be submitting a Grant request for funds to renovate the Luther House which will primarily be used by the Christian Counselling Center. Church signs on Hwys 46, 123 and 90A will be replaced. And Emanuel's continues to move forward in faith that God has a plan. We will be the church that God is calling us to be!!!



Pastor Marcus did a great job keeping us all up-to-date on Camp Chrysalis shenanigans June 10-15. Thank you for generously supporting this exciting ministry. Campers had adventures at every turn, from tackling a climbing tower with passion and devotion, to supporting and caring for each other in loving ways.


Confirmation Preparations


Lutheran World Relief School Bags

Vacation Bible School was a huge success for our Pre-K4 and Pre-K3 campers. Parents reported that their children had great time learning, playing and making new friends. Children collected several pounds of goods for the Christian Cupboard and donated them on the last day of VBS. We would all like to thank the many Spirit of Joy and Emanuel's volunteers whose hard work made this all possible for not only the Day School, but the Seguin community as well.

The Day School is installing a new software system, Smartcare. This system will incorporate payroll, staff and student attendance, records, calendars and newsletter for parents and a special "Parent Portal" whereby enrolled families have access to their statements, their child's behavior or incident reports and special messages about upcoming events, deadlines and even direct communication from the staff to the parents instantaneously. ELDS will be able to process echecks, debit and credit cards with Smartcare. Installation takes place in stages and we have already begun the process. We will be up and running by the beginning of the school year (August 23) or hopefully sooner. We all have to train on the software and, of course, resolve the inevitable glitches that occur in the beginning with a new system. Smartcare will be a great move forward for us in providing a more user-friendly communication system and service of financial convenience for our busy families.



The Day School is beginning a waiting list for the Pre-K3 room for the 2018-2019 school year. Calls and visits continue on an almost daily basis for all three rooms. Referrals from our congregation as well as current and former families are always our best source of potential enrollments.
