

### "With You, God is Well Pleased."

I am in theological and liturgical limbo as I write to you. I want to jump for joy as the women proclaim from the tomb that Jesus is gone (Mark 16:8), but at the same time I realize I haven't made it through Good Friday. My theological side says, "But you are an Easter church. Celebrate it and gives thanks for what God has done in Jesus Christ." Yet my liturgical side says, "In order to see and experience the fullness of God's love and grace, you need the darkness of Good Friday." Two sides of the same coin for sure, but both equally important realities of our church life. I don't want to limit the activity of God and say that God's grace, hope, and love can only be seen amidst tragedy or death. That would be absurd and completely not biblical. God certainly works through joy and happiness to bring about God's Kingdom. The act of creation itself, for example (Genesis 1 &2), is about God rejoicing at what was deemed "good," and God being so happy with creation, God grants Godself some "R and R." But what about this identified tension? How does Good Friday fit into the world and paradigm of a church centered on resurrection?

I believe we answer this question by looking to the Son, Jesus Christ. Jesus came into this world fully divine and fully human; the incarnation of the Emanuel, "God with Us." By way of the Holy Spirit, Jesus took upon himself the mantle of being God's only begotten Son and the son of Mary and Joseph. That means that Jesus was the miracle worker of the "Wedding at Cana" (John 2:1-12), and the seemingly forsaken child of the Garden of Gethsemane (Luke 22:39-46). Jesus was endowed with the ability to do all that God has already, is, and will do, yet Jesus Christ faced the atrocities of what it means to live in a sinful world. People, leadership or otherwise, make decisions that harm life, hinder life, even end life, and Jesus was certainly not immune to those realities. This means that, without slipping into the world of sin, Jesus faced all that we face in every day life. Temptation (Matthew 4:1-11), grief and loss (John 11:1-44), joy and celebration (Luke 10:21-24), hope in friendship (Mark 1:16-20), betrayal (Mark 14:43-51), the list is almost endless. Ultimately, Jesus' vocal disdain for and stand against the self-engorging religious leadership and self-centered Roman leadership killed him (John 19:28-30). Nothing in our human existence is beyond the experience nor the reach of Jesus Christ. No

matter how deep the pit, how painful the journey, how frightful the experience, or how joyous the celebration, Jesus Christ has been there and when these times become our realities, he promises to accompany us through them (Matthew 28:19-20). Therefore, we can take things to Christ in prayer and be candid, frustrated, exuberant, angry, upset, even doubtful, because he has been there, and he wants us to bring those things to him; to exchange our yoke for his (Matthew 11:28-10). Jesus wants to accompany us through it all. So how does this fit back with my original tension between Good Friday and Easter Sunday?

Using Jesus Christ as the example, the one in which God poured out grace, hope, and love so abundantly that even death couldn't hold on, we can see that nothing in life, no matter how bad or good, is beyond God. God's power in Easter Sunday, and all the glory therein, is magnified when we see that God brought us through Good Friday first. Whether they were times of the greatest celebrations or times of the greatest forsakenness and pain, God in Jesus Christ was there. We cannot escape the reality that life will always be a place full of ups and downs, Good Friday death and Easter Sunday resurrection. Yet through it all, and by the grace of God, we are never alone. We walk with the Emanuel who has been to hell and back for our sake. He is the one who took upon himself the sins of the world, even though he knew no sin so that, "...in him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Corinthians 5:20-21, NRSV). Holy Weekend reminds us of the extent to which God will go to save and embrace those whom God loves.

Every year we remember and celebrate the ups and downs of Christ's life, not because we know nothing else or have nothing else to do, but because it is the most important rhythm in life we could possibly return. It reminds us, proves to us, that God's love is beyond comprehension, so out of sync with our world, that we need constant reminding that we are loved, we are saved, and we are God's own blessed children. There is no greater message at Easter than that, the same declaration Jesus hears at his baptism, "You are my Son [Daughter], the Beloved; with you I am well pleased" (Mark 1:11, NRSV.) You, children of the resurrection, are God's beloved and with you God is well pleased. Believe it. Embrace it. And live differently because of it. Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed, alleluia!

As the April newsletter "goes to press", we are in the midst of Holy Week and the period of Lent comes to a close. As has become his custom, Pastor Marcus introduced a new (to ELC) type of service for our Wednesday evening gathering, the Holden Evening Prayer Service. Thank you to Ethan Koepp who served as cantor and Melissa Barbre who provided flute accompaniment to the very able pianist, Tom Engler. A special thanks to all who provided nourishment for the meal following each service.

Easter will begin the new month. A time of renewal. With the submission of the completed Stewardship Time and Talent sheets, work will begin to renew the organization of a committee structure. Based on interests noted on the Time and Talent sheets, individuals will be contacted to serve on one of the following committees: Communications; Fellowship; Congregational Care; Property Stewards; Stewardship; Youth & Family; Personnel; Finance; Worship & Music; Social Concerns & Outreach and Evangelism. A Council member has volunteered to be on 1 or more of these committees, but 1 person does not a committee make. As Pastor often says, "Emanuel's does Worship well", however, we need to put the same efforts into all of our programs and reach beyond the walls of the church in ministry.

Facility planning continues. The architectural firm, Fisher-Heck, has invoiced and been paid \$22,083.56 for the 2nd planning phase. The original proposed cost for this phase was \$42,000. We are now in the 3rd phase of design/build. Plans show removal of 5 rows of pews at the back of the sanctuary to allow for enlarging the Narthex. The question has been raised as to why create a larger Narthex for hospitality when the Narthex is not currently often used in that capacity. We are fortunate to have relatively good weather throughout the year and a beautiful oak tree which allows for fellowship outdoors. When weather does not permit, having the hospitality cart in the Narthex creates a bit of chaos due to lack of space. In another direction, much discussion is being held as to whether to replace the current inoperable lift with another lift to access the Fellowship Hall from the education wing or build a ramp. Initially, we expected to build a ramp, but we need to remedy the lack of access as quickly as possible. At this point, the cost of building a ramp or replacing the lift appears to be comparable. In terms of the Day School facility, Fisher-Heck has been asked to focus on the church access project for now as the cost of the most recently modified Day School facility plans still came in at a cost of \$1.2-1.5 million. The Day School Advisory Board is in the process of developing a Strategic Plan to provide a more concrete understanding of future expectations and facility needs.

The Property Stewards keep being reminded that the facilities are showing their age. Three bids to replace the non-functional heat pump system (AC) needed for the elevator shaft at the Mountain St entrance were obtained. Council approved the bid of \$4500 submitted by Diamond Air. A representative of the insurance company, Guide One, which provides all of the insurance for Emanuel's, inspected all campus facilities. His findings resulted in an ultimatum stating that Emanuel's had 6 weeks to create a plan involving the replacement of the roof covering the entire sanctuary due to the age of the roof. Given that we had had 2 roofing contractors find that the roof did not need replacing, a 3rd roofing contractor was contacted. After doing a thorough inspection of the roof, the 3rd contractor stated that the asbestos shingles would probably outlast the building itself. However, the flat roof at the juncture of the sanctuary and education wing does need to be replaced which would not be news to the Monday quilters who know to place trash cans to catch dripping water when it rains. The cost of replacing this portion of the roof is approximately \$35,000. The gutters also need to be cleaned. We have since received word that the current roof does not need to be replaced which is most likely a savings of in excess of \$1 million.

The Call Process is moving forward for selection of an Associate Pastor. Four rostered candidates have submitted their profiles. Second interviews of the candidates will have been completed on 3/24/18. Each candidate is experienced and has excellent qualities which would allow him/her to work in concert with Pastor to move Emanuel's forward in a positive direction.

A prime focus of Emanuel's when this church was established 148 years ago was community outreach. It is time to renew our presence in the whole of God's community. With Pastor Marcus as our coach, let us work together as a team to—"Be the Church God is calling us to be by declaring God's love, serving others and embracing all".

## Emanuel's Day School News



We are grateful for their compassion and generosity and are confident that this effort will lead to an expanded and permanent scholarship program for the Day School in the future.



## Lutheran World Relief Quilt and Kit Ingathering

Each spring, trucks, trailers and vans from Lutheran churches in the southwest Texas area converge on Jackson Park parking lot at Texas Lutheran University. Boxes and boxes of quilts and kits are, in an amazing 7 hours of volunteer energy, packed into two 18-wheelers. It has been an interesting event with New Braunfels' Cross Lutheran School Junior Honor Society, TLU students (very nice when the athletes arrive!), and a bunch of us more seasoned folks. Determination and goodwill carry the day. These materials are distributed overseas from the LWR warehouse in Baltimore. Last year Emanuel's quilts were shipped from the warehouse to the Russian province Georgia and the school kits were sent to Serbia and Burkina Faso.

This year Emanuel's will send about 275 quilts and 110 school kits and Personal Care Kits now being assembled – all items to which many members have contributed time and donations. Ladies Aid has donated \$550 to the Quilt and Kit Shipping Fund. The Blessing of the Quilts and Kits was a part of worship on Palm Sunday, March 25.

On the Wednesday after Easter, April 6, our boxes will be moved from our church building to the 18-wheelers. We welcome muscle and trucks, trailers, and vans on that day at 8 a.m. at our church building to load and transport our boxes to Jackson Park at TLU. Always we welcome – and need – help. If you can join us on that day, please do.


### Synod Assembly May 4-6 Hospitality Team
