

You're Beloved

In a world that has harnessed itself to the fast-paced machine that is achievement over self-care, an "If you're not first you're last," mentality, to use the words friends." (Nouwen, 29) Nouwen goes on to remind us of "Talladega Nights" character Ricky Bobby, it is no wonder we are not all sick, all the time. It is almost commonplace, especially as I visit with folks out and about in the community, to hear them say, "I am busier cannot wait for Memorial Day weekend so I can take a breather." Or, "I wonder if I will ever catch up on sleep." In some of these cases, the phrase was uttered with a mortified look of, "How did I get to this place?" while others carry it as a badge of honor. As a person that has a predisposition for working too much, too long, and without care for personal wellbeing, I connect with these phrases. I have and continue to walk the paths of always feeling that I can get one more thing done, that the to-do list could get one more check, or that I haven't made today "count enough" so I better finish this project. Have you ever uttered these things to yourself? As summer rolls on and our church staff and family looks to a dynamically, spiritually, and event-filled few months, I want us all to remember that the care of self begins with just that, the self. As the adage states, "We cannot pour from an empty cup."

One of my favorite spirituality books is Life of the Beloved by Henri Nouwen. In this small letter to a friend, Nouwen is asked to write about the spiritual life, what it is, and what it means. He begins, "Ever since you asked me to write for you and your friends about the spiritual life, I have been wondering if there might be one word I would most want you to remember when you finished reading all I wish to say...It is

the word 'Beloved,' and I am convinced that it has been given to me for sake of you and your that the first time we hear this word in the context of scripture if when the voice descends like a dove from heaven at Jesus' baptism, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased." (Mark 1:10, NRSV) now that I am retired then when I was working." Or, "I I define beloved as being "utterly and completely embraced, cared for, and treasured by someone who sees us for who God has created us to be." This person sees us amid all our flaws, all our joys, all our accomplishments, all our sins, and without question cares for us. There are many people in our lives who might see us in this way and for those relationships we must be beyond thankful. They help remind us that the value of our lives is not rooted in the world, but in the promises that washed over us in baptism. It is by their voices and their actions, of always seeing us and being with us, that we are indeed hear that Gospel promise, "You are loved so much, God acted." It is making the transition from hearing those words, seeing those actions, and being embraced by our friends and family to allowing it to become a part of the very fabric of who we are that is often a great struggle. But, if we can learn to hear those words and allow them to wash over us and fill us, we will begin the journey of learning to care for oneself and rejuvenation.

> God sees us for who we are, individuals cut from the very fabric of God's own imagination, the holders of the breath of life. It is God who, and not just at the waters of baptism, sees us as beloved and reminds us, day in and day out, that we have been liftedup for a unique purpose. And when we seemingly don't hear nor


listen to God, it is God who lifts voices and places up around us that remind us of our unyielding worth in the Kingdom of God come about in this world.

Nouwen writes, "...although I have a tendency to say many things to God, the real 'work' of prayer is to become silent and listen to the voice that says good things about me." (Nouwen, 75-76) Finding a place of silent prayer, a place to reflect and hear God's loving and gracious voice, amid the machine of achievement, is a part of that struggle. It is when we find these moments that we are filled the most, that our cups replenish, and we are truly prepared for another day. Hearing the Word of God, the Voice of Creation, echoing in our souls and minds, is what brings life back to our empty cups.

"Dedication of Emanuel's Lutheran Parish House"

SEGUIN, TEXAS

APRIL 7th A. D. 1929



CONGREGATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

With Rev. Franz Weisskopffs pastorate a period of steady development was ushered in for Emanuel's Lutheran congregation. In 1886 the congregation joined the Texas synod. Rev. Weisskopff continued to serve Elm Creek and in 1887 organized the congregation at Kingsbury. In 1888 the congregation voted to withdraw from the Texas synod and remained without synodical connections until 1924. During the year of 1889 the church building was renovated and a tower added, at an expense of \$1416.00. On account of ill health Rev. Weisskopff asked for his dismissal in a congregational meeting held December 20. 1895 to take effect March the first, 1896. The congregation prevailed upon him to stay one more year which he finally agreed to do.

Rev. Weisskopff served the congregation for twelve years and six months. During his stay the congregation experienced an unusual growth and expansion.

On June the first 1897 Dr. Wm. Steinmann of Fredericksburg, came to Seguin. Two years later the Ladies Aid was organized. He was a musician and a lover of good music and through his efforts our church choir was organized in the same year. This organization has enhanced our church services during all these years. During the synodical convention at Fredericksburg in 1911 Dr. Steinmann was instrumental in inducing the Texas synod to move its college from Brenham to Seguin. With the coming of the college to this city a new church edifice became a necessity. The present beautiful building was erected and dedicated July 6, 1913. The La-dies Aid assisted in beautifying the new church home. The Senior Luther League was organized in 1916.

After nearly 23 years Dr. Steinmann resigned and November 1,

1919 moved to Westhoff. He now resides with his daughter Clara in San Antonio and he as well as his wife put in an occasional call with their old friends here. Rev. Rueter served the congregation in the interim until Rev. Theo. M. Janssen ceived new runners and carpets. was elected.

OUR PARISH HOUSE

In March 1920, Rev. Janssen came to Seguin and on Palm Sunday preached his first sermon. On May 30, 1920 the congregation celebrated its fiftieth anniversary. During that year four additional lots were purchased for \$4,000.00 in order to secure room for further development. The ladies purchased the furnaces in the following year. They then set a new goal for themselves and started a fund

for a pipe organ. In 1923 our beautiful Kilgen organ equipped with complete chimes was dedicated. Suitable liturgical Altar and Pulpit hangings were provided and the church and altar room re-At this time a step was taken which proved extremely beneficial to our entire work. The envelope system was introduced and this system has put an end to all financial worries.

The constant growth of the congregation made necessary another improvement. The Sunday School had grown to such an extent that new quarters became imperative. Besides, the various societies of the church had no suitable meeting place. For several years the congregation had

thought of constructing a parish House and in the meeting held January, 1928 the Ladies Aid offered two thousand dollars as a nucleus. Committees were appointed to report at a meeting to be held on March 4, 1928 and at this time it was unanimously decided to carry out the project at once. Eickenroht and Cocke. architects were engaged to prepare suitable plans and the contract was let in September to Goodrum and Nolte, The cornerstone was laid on November 25, 1928. The Revs. Weeber, Goerner, and Haag had part in the services and Rev. Jansen assisted by Mr. Geo. Hagn, president of the congregation, laid the cornerstone.

Hon. A. P. Mueller, Hon. F. E. Knetsch, and Prof. J. F. Saegert, Superintendent of city schools and superintendent of Sunday School, delivered suitable addresses.

In 1926 an English Missionary Society had been organized and in the beginning of this year a Junior League was called into existence. Both societies are filling a long felt need. They too will greatly benefit by our new Parish House.

The New Parish House is a spacious and modern brick structure, 98x70. The main auditorium has a seating capacity of 900 and will easily accomodate 1000. The stage, 20x50 is so magnificently furnished that we can point to it with pride. In addition a pastor's study and three additional committee rooms are located on the main floor. The basement is 35x68 with modern kitchen equip-ment designed to meet every need; it also contains the nursery. In order to encourage good music the Luther League has provided the building with a concert grand piano, 7 ft. 7 inches in length. An additional upright has also been secured,

The congregation thru its whole hearted cooperation and generous response has made possible the erection of our new Parish House at a cost of slightly more than \$28,000.00. Ebenezer- "Hitherto the Lord has helped us." May He continue to bless our work and recreation in our new quarters.

BOOK REVIEW

THE MAGNIFICENT DEFEAT

As a novelist and memoirist, Frederick Buechner brings to these meditations on biblical passages a keen eye for narrative and detail. He brings as well an artist's love for language. As he says of James Weldon Johnson's poetic rendering of the creation story, this "is the language that man always uses when he tries to talk about the real mysteries of exist-

ence." So too is it the language Buechner brings to these reflections, which similarly explore the real mysteries. Written simply and directly (their original audience was a group of students at the private school where the author was a minister), Buechner delves into topics ranging from Jacob's wrestling with the angel (this is the "magnificent defeat" of the title) to the annunciation and birth of Jesus and beyond. Whatever the topic, Buechner writes with clarity and honesty. He does not present himself as among the saints so much

as among the seekers. He doubts and questions but always comes back to the central place of beauty and of joy: here, he suggests, is where we must place our faith. Here is the true miracle of life, inviting us to "open our arms, our lives, to the deepest miracle of reality itself and call it by its proper name, which is King of kings and Lord of lords, or call it by any name we want, or call it nothing, but live our lives open to the fierce and transforming joy of it."

Short Bio:

An American writer, novelist, poet, autobiographer, essayist, preacher, and theologian. Buechner is an ordained Presbyterian minister and the author of more than thirty published books. His work encompasses different genres, including fiction, autobiography, essays and sermons, and his career has spanned more than six decades. Buechner's books have been translated into many languages for publication around the world. He is best known for his novels, including A Long Day's Dying, The Book of Bebb, Godric (a finalist for the 1981 Pulitzer Prize), and Brendan, his memoirs, including Telling Secrets and The Sacred Journey, and his more theological works, including Secrets in the Dark, The Magnificent Defeat, and Telling the Truth.




